Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Styphnolobium japonicum syn. Sophora japonica (SOj)

Common Name: Pagoda tree

Species Description

- Deciduous
- Medium sized, upright, rounded to spreading tree
- Light grey-brown bark, furrowed on the trunk
- Bright to dark green <u>pinnately</u> <u>compound</u> foliage
- Yellow/cream fragrant flowers in pendulous racemes in summer
- Green seed pods, turning to yellow-brown, similar in appearance to a string of beads

Height and width

12 to 15 metres tall by 10 metres wide

Species origin

Eastern Asia

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥45m³
- Suitable for use as a street tree and a specimen tree in urban parks
- Should not be planted within 4 metres of hydraulic services

Use considerations

- Grows moderately well in Canberra's climate
- Moderate frost and drought tolerance once established
- · Grows best in deeper, moist, well-drained soils
- Prefers full sun
- Long lived
- Moderate to fast growth rate
- Very low flammability
- · Can have issues with canker
- Tolerant of pollution
- Formative pruning is required to develop a single trunk
- Fruit drop may be a nuisance in pedestrian areas
- Attracts insects
