Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Fagus sylvatica 'Purpurea' (Fsp)

Common Name: Copper beech, Purple beech

New species

Species Description

- Deciduous
- Shapely spreading tree with rounded crown
- Bark is smooth and grey, becoming textured with age
- Attractive dark purple leaves
- Insignificant flowers in mid-spring
- Nuts are within a prickly husk

Height and width

12 metres tall by 8 metres wide

Species origin

Europe; the 'Purpurea' cultivar is listed as first being noted near Zurich in 1680

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥30m³
- A beautiful specimen tree in parks or large gardens due to its attractive leaves and bark
- Suitable for use as a street tree, in commercial precincts and in home gardens
- Should not be planted near nature reserves, creeks or watercourses

Use considerations

- · Generally a hardy tree once established
- High frost tolerance and moderate drought tolerance
- Will grow on a wide range of soils, including poorly drained saline, limestone and clay soils, but does not grow well on sandy sites
- Long lived
- Slow to moderate growth rate
- Low flammability
- Susceptible to oak leaf miner and aphids attack, but otherwise relatively free of pests and diseases
- Requires appropriate irrigation in establishment years
