Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Quercus engelmannii (Qen) Common Name: Mesa oak

Species Description

- <u>Semi-evergreen</u> to evergreen
- Medium sized, broad spreading, round headed tree
- Grey-green bark
- Leaves are small, almost entire and dull green
- Narrow, drooping yellow-green male <u>catkins</u> and inconspicuous female flowers in spring
- Stout egg-shaped acorns

Height and width

15 metres tall by 14 metres wide

Species origin

Southern California, USA to Baja California, Mexico

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥70m³
- Appropriate for park or broad street plantings, or a specimen tree with appropriate space
- Worth considering for dry sites

Use considerations


- Suitable for Canberra's climate, growing naturally in a Mediterranean climate
- High frost and drought tolerance
- Has grown well in shaley to clay loam soils in Canberra
- Long lived
- Slow growing
- Low flammability
- May be affected by oak leaf miner
- Dense evergreen foliage could impede solar access
- Acorn drop may be a nuisance in pedestrian areas
