Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Pinus eldarica (Ple)

Common Name: Mondell Pine

#### **New species**

#### **Species Description**

- Evergreen
- Pyramidal form, with the canopy sometimes extending to near ground level
- Silvery-grey bark, becoming furrowed and darker with age
- Needles 8 to 14 centimetres long, held in fascicles of two
- Insignificant flowers
- Reddish-brown ovate to oblong cones

### Height and width

15 metres tall by 10 metres wide

#### **Species origin**

From a small area with a semi-desert environment in central Asia

### Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥45m³
- Can be used as a specimen tree in parks
- Useful as a windbreak
- Should not be planted near nature reserves, creeks or watercourses

#### **Use considerations**

- Suits arid climates with cold winters
- High frost and drought tolerance
- Adapted to calcareous soils with moderate alkalinity; local specimens can be found growing in clay-loams and shale soils. Prefers well-drained sites.
- Prefers full sun
- Long lived
- Moderate growth rate
- Moderate to high flammability
- Produces pollen and seeds; attracts birds
- Canopy can be high pruned if access is required
- Cone drop may be a nuisance in pedestrian areas
