Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Acer platanoides 'Crimson King' (ACpk) New species

Common Name: Purple Norway maple

Species Description

- Deciduous
- Medium sized tree with rounded crown
- · Greyish-black, lightly textured bark
- Purple <u>palmately lobed</u> leaves throughout the growing season, changing to red, brown and orange in autumn
- Reddish-orange flowers in clusters in spring
- Brown-green double-winged <u>samaras</u>

Height and width

15 metres tall by 10 metres wide

Species origin

Northern Europe; the cultivar was a chance seedling from *Acer platanoides 'Schwedleri'* (Belgium) that was introduced in the USA in 1947

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥45m³
- Can be used as a street tree in older suburbs where hot summer winds will not scorch leaves
- Suitable for use in parks, commercial areas and home gardens; not suitable for natural areas

Use considerations

- Suits all areas of the ACT, except new <u>greenfield</u> developments where leaf burn may occur in summer with hot winds and inadequate watering, especially during the establishment stage
- High frost tolerance and moderate drought tolerance
- Will grow in most soils, including clay
- Medium longevity
- Moderate growth rate
- Very low flammability
- Shallow root system could lead to future maintenance requirements
- Produces significant nectar and pollen which attract bees and other pollinators
