Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Fraxinus americana (FRa) New

Common Name: American ash, White ash

New species

Species Description

- Deciduous
- Erect, vase shaped tree when young with a rounded canopy when older
- Grey to brown bark with corky ridges
- Dark green pinnately <u>compound</u> leaves with 7 leaflets each
- Insignificant flowers in spring and prominent winter buds
- One winged, flattened samaras

Height and width

15 metres tall by 12 metres wide

Species origin

North America

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥45m³
- Can be used in street tree plantings and in parks, preferably those that are irrigated
- Suitable for use in commercial precincts and large urban residential gardens
- Should not be planted near nature reserves, creeks or watercourses

Use considerations

- High frost tolerance and low drought tolerance
- Suitable for a wide range of soils and growing conditions but grows best in deep, well drained moist soils
- Long lived
- · Fast growth rate
- Low flammability
- Can be subject to heavy infestations of ash whitefly and subsequent honeydew and sooty mould, which can be difficult to treat in public areas
