

# Design Standards for Urban Infrastructure

Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Prunus padus (Ppa) New species

Common Name: Bird cherry, Hackberry

#### **Species Description**

- Deciduous
- Tall tree with upright growing branches
- Smooth brown bark
- Elliptical dark green leaves, becoming red/yellow in autumn
- Drooping <u>racemes</u> of almond-scented white flowers in spring
- Small bitter black fruit

### Height and width

10 to 12 metres tall by 6 metres wide

#### **Species origin**

Southern Europe

#### Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥15m³
- Ideal for use as a street tree or avenue tree due to its upward branching
- Can be used in urban parks, commercial shopping precincts and home gardens
- Fruit drop may be a minor nuisance in pedestrian areas

#### **Use considerations**

- Suits all climactic conditions of the ACT and performs well in private gardens locally
- High frost tolerance and moderate drought tolerance
- Tolerates all soils in the ACT
- Prefers full sun
- Medium longevity
- Moderate growth rate
- Very low to no flammability
- A good source of nectar which attracts bees and birds
