Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Eucalyptus mannifera 'Little Spotty' (Emfl)

Common Name: Little Spotty

Species Description

- Single trunked with a rounded crown
- Attractive smooth white bark turning
- red/pink in summer
- Bluish green lanceolate leaves
- Flowers in spring to autumn
- Small rounded woody fruit

Height and width

8 metres tall by 7 metres wide

Species origin

A selected form of the species

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥15m³
- Suitable for use as a street tree, in parks and commercial precincts
- May be suitable for narrow verges and corridors, but not in screening or shelter belts
- Suitable for use in home gardens

Use considerations

- Very suitable for Canberra's climate
- High frost and drought tolerance
- · Grows naturally on poorer clayey soils to rocky shallow soils
- Medium to long lived
- Fast to moderate growth rate
- Flammable, but less so then other species due to smooth bark and high branching habit; could be used in the <u>inner asset protection zone</u>
- Susceptible to usual eucalypt pests and disease
- Responds well to formative pruning and may require periodic removal of deadwood
- Produces pollen, seeds and a small amount of nectar
- Attracts bees and birds
- Provides habitat for local wildlife
