# Design Standards for Urban Infrastructure 

## Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Eucalyptus leucoxylon'Rosea’ (Elr)
New species Common Name: Red flowering yellow gum

## Species Description

- Evergreen
- Small tree, often multi-branched from a low level
- Cream to grey bark, shedding in flakes
- Grey-green foliage
- Prominent red flowers from March to December
- Fruit are hard, globular or hemispherical nuts


## Height and width

10 to 15 metres tall by 6 to 10 metres wide

## Species origin

The origin of the cultivar 'Rosea' is not certain and may be from Eucalyptus leucoxylon subspecies megalocarpa or Eucalyptus petiolaris (previously another subspecies of Eucalyptus leucoxylon)

## Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: $\geq 45 \mathrm{~m}^{3}$

- A good small eucalypt for limited use in urban parks and home gardens due to its variable performance in Canberra


## Use considerations

- Requires a well-drained site for good growth
- Moderate frost tolerance and high drought tolerance
- Suitable for most sites, favouring sandy loams to clay-based soils
- Short to medium longevity
- Fast growth
- High flammability
- Subject to common eucalypt pests and diseases
- Produces seeds, honey and a small amount of pollen
- Provides excellent habitat for birds
- Has not always performed well in Canberra


## Examples in Canberra

Dowthwaite Street, Fraser; Brereton Street, Garran

## Availability

May require forward ordering, and variations can occur in seed
