I refer to your application for access to government information received by Transport Canberra and City Services (TCCS) on 2 March 2023. It is my understanding that you are seeking access to the following government information:

"... all documents relating to the removal of trees during the summer of Dec 2022 and Jan 2023, along the perimeter of Canberra Girls Grammar School, along Gawler Crescent and Melbourne Avenue, outside the Boarding House building including:

- arborist report and any other supporting material that led to the decision to approve the removal of trees along Gawler Cres and Melbourne Ave, Canberra Girls Grammar School (southern corner of the grounds)
- the determination by the conservator under the Tree Protection Act 2005,
- any correspondence between the ACT Government and the School or representatives of the School in relation to the application and decision under the Act."

Timeframes

In accordance with section 40 of the FOI Act, a decision is due on your application by 31 March 2023.

Authority

I am an Information Officer appointed by the Director-General under section 18 of the Act to deal with access applications made under Part 5 of the FOI Act.

Decision on access

In accordance with the FOI Act, a search of TCCS records has been completed and 14 records have been identified as relevant to your application.

Upon reviewing the information within the records and applying the public interest test under section 17 of the FOI Act, I have decided to provide you with partial access to these records. The reasons for my decision are detailed below in the statement of reasons.

The records identified as relevant to your application are listed in the schedule enclosed at <u>Attachment A.</u> A copy of the records is enclosed at <u>Attachment B.</u>

Statement of Reasons

In reaching my access decision, I have taken the following into account:

- The FOI Act; and
- The Human Rights Act 2016.

In making my decision on disclosing the relevant government information, I must identify all relevant factors in schedule 1 and 2 of the FOI Act and determine, on balance, where the public interest lies.

Schedule 1:

No relevant sections identified.

Schedule 2:

Factors favouring disclosure in the public interest (Section 2.1)

- Section 2.1(a)(i) promote open discussion of public affairs and enhance the government's accountability; and
- Section 2.1(a)(viii) reveal the reason for a government decision and any background or contextual information that informed the decision.

Factors favouring non-disclosure (Section 2.2)

• Section 2.2(a)(ii) - prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy or any other right under the Human Rights Act 2016.

In reviewing the relevant records, personal information relating to third parties, including information which is likely to identify a third party, has been identified. I have considered that this information is not readily available to the public and the disclosure of this information is likely to prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy under the Human Rights Act 2004 and carries significant weight. In this instance, I have found the disclosure of personal information to be, on balance, contrary to the public interest.

I have found that the factors favouring disclosure can be satisfied with the deletion of information which is contrary to the public interest. A copy of the relevant information is enclosed at <u>Attachment B</u>.

Charges

In accordance with Freedom of Information (Fees) Determination 2018, a fee of \$0.35 per page of information disclosed, except for the first 50 pages, may be applied to an access application have decided not to apply a fee of \$5.60 as the total number of pages marginally exceeds the fee-free threshold.

TREE MANAGEMENT AND PROTECTION NOTES

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PROTECTION OF PUBLIC LANDSCAPE ASSETS ADJACENT TO DEVELOPMENT WORKS ON UNLEASED TERRITORY LAND -**PUBLIC OPEN SPACE.**

EXCAVATION OF EXISTING PAVEMENTS

- The existing pavements must stay in place until all other works are completed
- No machinery is to be allowed within the verge or TPZ without approval from TCCS Urban Trees. The contact person is required to notify a TCCS officer on 62071574 or email TCCS.UrbanTreesDDCoord@act.gov.au
- To ensure no root damage occurs, the removal of the existing pavement shall be carefully done in small sections and only to the depth of the existing material so as not to break up material and cause damage to tree roots.
- 4. Care must be taken with the removal of pavement and subbase to ensure no roots are pulled away in the process. Please refer to points 6.7 & 8 above for treatment of roots exposed as a result of the removal of pavement. THIS WOULD BE A HOLDING POINT WHERE URBAN TREESCAPES WOULD INSPECT THE SITE BEFORE ANY WORKS COMMENCE.
- 5. Exploratory works to identify roots within proposed construction zone must be done by hand in an outward direction radially from the trunk, and in the case of the line of the proposed driveway, by Hydrovac.
- 6. Hand dug or Hydro-vac excavation of a strip trench along the line of the edge of the proposed driveway to a depth no more than the existing material located within the TPZ of any potentially impacted trees. Hydro excavation works must be carried out with no greater than 1500psi using a fan shaped nozzle and not by direct jet spray activities as these works must not remove the bark from the
- 7. Where tree roots greater than 30mm are uncovered and require trimming, they must be cut cleanly with equipment specifically designed for this purpose by suitably qualified arborist. THIS WOULD BE A HOLDING POINT WHERE URBAN TREESCAPES WOULD INSPECT THE SITE BEFORE ANY WORKS COMMENCE. - Any uncovered tree roots shall be covered immediately with geotextile or hessian fabric and watered regularly to ensure roots don't dry out.

MACHINERY NEAR TREES

- 1. If vehicles or machinery are required within the Tree Protection Zone (Canopy +2 metres) of the street tree, compaction control measures such as 10-15cm of mulch must be spread out over the area to be used, with rumble boards over the top to prevent compaction of the soil. Compaction of soil significantly reduces the amount of available water to the roots of trees and this has an adverse effect on tree health. The compaction control measures to be used must be demonstrated on a Landscape Management and Protection Plan (LMPP) to ensure the tree remains viable
- The LMPP must be endorsed prior to vehicles accessing the area



Appendix 1

Part A - Explanations of Terms Used in the Tree Assessments

This Tree Assessment form has been developed to conform to the requirements of 'Notifiable Instrument NI2007-422', and The AS4970-2009 'Protection of trees on development sites

1. Tree Number

This is a unique sequential identification number allocated to each tree located on the block, overhanging or the verge. Species

The binomial species name is given.

2. Height

The tree height was estimated except where the size was determined to be near 12m, in which case it was measured using a clinometer from a measured offset. Heights of between 11 and 12 metres are recorded as 11metres.

3. Directional Canopy Radii.'

Canopy radii were measured at 90° intervals starting at the north by stepping. Where it is indicated that a more accurate radius may be necessary, it was estimated by tape measure.

The four radial canopy diameters are shown (in meters) in the 'table. Where measurement of these would require entry onto neighbouring blocks or access was difficult, the measurements have been estimated. If needed, the broadest canopy diameter is also measured to determine if a tree is regulated.

4. Health

It is an indication of the tree's health and vigour. It has been judged against the following range:

Very Good (VG), Good (G), Fair (F), Poor (P), or Very Poor (VP)

General comments on the tree's health and vigour and specific comments on evidence of **insect** infestation or **disease** presence in the tree are included in the **Comments Column** if significant.

5. Structure

The structural integrity of the tree has been judged against the following range: Very Good (VG), Good (G), Fair (F), Poor (P), or Very Poor (VP) General comments on the tree's structure and specific comments on evidence of Root Zone Disturbance and Structural Damage are included in the Comments Column if significant.

6. Tree Protection Status

The legal status of each of the trees is given as one of the following:

Part B - Method and Limits

Mathad

The inspection of the trees was limited to a visual examination from ground level without the use of boring or testing devices.

Not Regulated -no protection required, can be retained, or removed.

Park Tree -protected by legislation other than the Tree Protection Act 2005. To be covered by the LMPP (Landscape Management and Protection Plan) or otherwise negotiated with the Urban treescapes section of TCCS.

Pest Plant - is a weed: no protection required may be removed without a permit (or retained: -depending on the classification level).

Regulated Tree -a tree that, due to its size, is classified as a 'Regulated Tree' under 'The Tree Protection Act 2005' and therefore, a permit would be required to: Remove the tree, Prune the tree, except where a qualified arborist does the pruning to the 'Australian Standard for Pruning of Amenity Trees' AS 4373. Carry out groundwork within 2m of the 'drip line of the tree.

A Tree Management Plan formulated according to the 'Notifiable Instrument NI2007-422: *Tree Protection (Guidelines for Tree Management Plans) Determination 2007' is* designed to act as an application for the Tree Damaging Activities associated with this development.

It registered Tree -a tree nominated to the 'Significant Tree' Register. It may have more rigorous protection measures than a regulated tree (refer to its listing on the Tree Register.

Remnant – a regulated tree that is also a remnant eucalypt. For a Remnant, the Approval Criteria 1 (1) (d) (Inappropriate location) & (e) (substantially affecting solar access) in Disallowable Instrument *Tree Protection (Approval Criteria) Determination (No.2) DI2006-60* do not apply. Remnant eucalypt is not defined in the DI2006-60. This assessment is taken as a eucalypt that was likely to be present at the initial subdivision of the land on which it stands.

Schedule 2 – a regulated tree of a species listed in Schedule 2 of Disallowable Instrument *Tree Protection (Approval Criteria) Determination (No.2) DI2006-60.* Schedule 2 lists problematic tree species for which the conservator may approve removal if on a block of less than 1200m²

Street Tree -protected by legislation other than the Tree Protection Act 2005. It is covered by the Landscape Management and Protection Plan (LMPP).

7. Tree Quality Classification

These classifications are based on the guidelines in the 'Draft Guidelines for the Preparation of Tree Management Reports for Development on unleased Territory Land 2004 Draft'.

Poor – A poor-quality tree is of poor form, structure or health or is likely to represent a significant safety hazard.

Low - A tree that does not have significant amenity value. (the Low classification Quality has been added (by Canopy Tree Experts) to this classification to indicate a tree with no legal reason for removal other than its lack of significance in the landscape. Some of these trees may have the potential to become significant, in which case this is indicated in the 'comments' column.

Medium - A medium-quality tree is of proper form, structure and health and is not likely to represent a significant safety hazard.

The VTA method¹ was used. Defects were identified and evaluated along with the tree's response to those defects, the tree's health and the tree's

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High – A high-quality tree is of good form and condition without structural defects. It should not represent a significant hazard.

Exceptional- A tree may be considered unusual because it is an integral part of the landscape due to factors such as the prominence of location, contribution to the surrounding landscape and its general appearance. An exceptional tree should be free of any defects that remedial treatment cannot address. A tree may also be excellent for its **botanic/scientific**, **cultural** and **natural heritage** values. Trees with significant **botanic/scientific**, **cultural** and **natural heritage** values may not be ruled out of the exceptional classification due to health, structure or safety concerns.

8. Comments

Any relevant comments are recorded in this column, especially those related to health and structure and value.

9. Circumference⁴⁹⁷⁰

The trunk Circumference for the calculation of the Tree Protection Zone as per Australian Standard AS4970-2009 (TPZ⁴⁹⁷⁰) is the trunk circumference at 1.4m above ground level. It is expressed in metres and lists the individual trunk circumferences if more than one trunk is at that height. These are used to calculate the DBH and subsequently the **Radius TPZ**⁴⁹⁷⁰. Where there is more than one trunk at 1.4 m AGL, the DBH is calculated by the formula presented in AS4970-2009. (Branches, c.f. Trunks are not included).

10. Radius TPZ4970

The radius of the Root Protection Zone component of the Tree Protection Zone was calculated from the trunk diameter at 1.4m AGL as recommended by the AS4970-2009. Note the final TPZ^{4970} may need to be extended to include crown protection.

11. D10 TPZ

This is a construct of Canopy Tree Experts. It is the distance from the centre of the trunk to a straight-line excavation past the trunk that would excise 10% of the area of the TPZ 4970 . This measurement has no regulatory standing. It is only an indication of how much root loss may occur with such an excavation. Still, it should be interpreted in conjunction with on-site observations of where active absorptive roots are likely to be, species knowledge and water availability. It is presented here as one example of how a 10% loss of the TPZ 4970 area could occur.

12. Radius SRZ⁴⁹⁷⁰

The figure below approximates the Structural Root Zone diameter as proposed in AS4970-2009. It is approximate as it is calculated from the circumference at 1.4m AGL + 20% instead of the measurement at the root buttress. It is an <u>indication</u> only of the size of root ball required for tree stability

An accurate calculation of the SRZ may be needed if a significant encroachment into the TPZ⁴⁹⁷⁰ is envisaged.

Canberra Girls Grammar – Master Plan

I refer to your emails dated 21 September 2018 and 18 October 2018 and attached documentation illustrating the proposed Master Plan for Canberra Girls Grammar School.

The Master Plan includes works within the curtilage of the Canberra Girls Grammar School Boarding Housing (the Boarding House), a registered heritage place on the ACT Heritage Register. The exterior of the building (except the north-west side); the interior of the foyer; the setting of the building within the immediate landscape including the grassed quadrangle and shrubs, garden and trees around the buildings; the history and use of the buildings as boarding accommodation are identified as features intrinsic of the heritage significance of the Boarding House.

Development in the immediate vicinity of the Boarding House includes: construction of a four storey building and single storey covered walkway adjacent to the Boarding House (West Wing); demolition of existing maintenance sheds and ancillary structures; new car parking, soft and hard landscaping including removal of the existing Conifer 'hedge' at corner of Melbourne Avenue and Gawler Crescent.

Following consideration of the Master Plan, the Council provides the following preliminary comments:

The proposed West Wing and covered walkway are sited to the north-west of the Boarding House. The north-west side of the Boarding House is a later addition to the building of no heritage significance. The Council appreciates that the proposed West Wing and walkway would be sited to achieve visual separation between the significant exterior of the Boarding Housing and the new architecture. Opportunities to improve presentation of the north-west side of the Boarding House should also be included in the Master Plan.

In the indicative sections and elevations provided, the proposed West Wing building would not exceed the height of the existing Boarding House ridge line. This is important to ensure that the new architecture responds to the scale of the existing building.

The proposed demolition of existing sheds, carparking, soft and hard landscaping would reinstate an open setting for the Boarding House, and improve amenity for the school. The Council appreciates that the proposed landscape works aim to achieve an 'adaptive imagining of heritage landscape surrounds' and commends this approach.

The existing plantings at the corner of Melbourne Avenue and Gawler Crescent appear to be overgrown *Cupressus* that no longer provide an attractive 'formal' edge to the school grounds. An arrangement that provides for a more open setting at the intersection, as evidenced by historical photographs should be explored as part of the Master Plan. Smaller scale conifers planted in a formal arrangement may achieve this.

The Council provides in principal support for the development proposed by the Master Plan. To ensure that the detailed design does not diminish the heritage significance of the Boarding House detailed documentation of the West Wing, covered link and landscape elements in the immediate vicinity of the Boarding House, should be provided to Council for assessment prior to the commencement works. Council looks forward to receipt of this documentation in the future.

I refer to your submission of 6 October 2022 to the ACT Heritage Council (the Council), regarding proposed development at the Canberra Girls Grammar School Boarding House (the Boarding House) (Block 2 Section 9 Deakin).

The proposed works contains the demolition of existing maintenance sheds, ancillary structures and caretaker's cottage garage; expansion of the existing carpark, changes to the landscape setting, and associated tree removals.

The Boarding House is a registered heritage place on the ACT Heritage Register (the Register), and the exterior of the building (except its north west side), the interior of the foyer, and the setting of the building within the immediate landscape (including the grassed quadrangle and shrubs, gardens and trees around the buildings) are identified as features intrinsic to the heritage significance of the place. The proposed works are therefore subject to *Heritage Act 2004* requirements.

The submission, including the Landscape Heritage Strategy plans, follows the 2018 submission of the Master Plan for the works to the Council. Subsequently, the Council provided advice on 31 October 2018 which supported the Master Plan, subject to the submission of documentation of detailed design to ensure the proposal does not diminish the heritage significance of the Boarding House.

After reviewing the submitted documents, including the Landscape Heritage Strategy plans, I note that the proposal has been amended in several ways, and the following comments against *Heritage Act 2004* requirements are made for the contemporary proposal:

Demolition

It is noted that the Demolition Plan (DA002 - 5/10/2022) proposes to remove structures of facilities of offices and workshop, and the garage attached to the caretaker's cottage from the site.

These structures are not part of the original building on the site, and are not identified as features intrinsic of the place. Furthermore, the exterior of the Boarding House (except the north-west side) is identified as a heritage value and

the proposed demolition of these structures is considered to provide an open setting for the building that improves the visual dominancy of the building on site, and enhances the heritage features to be appreciated from the public domain.

Accordingly, the proposed demolition is supported.

New Parking and Landscape Setting

Review of the historical photos show that the Boarding House was originally sited in an open landscape setting to be visually appreciated from the public domain. While trees, shrubs and gardens are a significant part of the landscape setting of the building, the Register entry also identifies that the striking presence of the building from the public domain, particularly Melbourne Avenue, contributes to its aesthetic quality.

In this context, a balanced approach to the landscape setting is required, which retains some trees, shrubs and gardens around the building, but which also allows for a more open setting and enables views to this significant building from the public domain.

To achieve this, and as the previous Council advice on the Master Plan indicated, the existing plantings along block boundaries to Melbourne Avenue and Gawler Crescent appear to be overgrown *Cupressus* that not only do not provide an attractive 'formal' edge to the school grounds anymore, but also have built a natural screen to visually block the Boarding House from the public domain.

The Perimeter Hedge Replacement plan identifies the proposed removal of these perimeter trees and their replacement with new *Cupressus* trees. As such, their removal is supported, subject to a low scale *Cupressus* species being used to provide for a more open setting that also enables views to the Boarding House from the public domain.

It also is noted that 15 trees are nominated for removal from the immediate vicinity of the Boarding House building, and that replacement trees are proposed to reinstate its landscape setting and integrate trees into the expanded carpark and path network. As shown on the Tree Replacement Plan, existing *Eucalyptus mannifera* and ornamental shrubs are to be retained, with the exception of one ornamental shrub near the front entrance of the building. Its proposed replacement with an ornamental shrub no more than 1m high is supported.

However, the new parking layout also proposes 15 Chinese Elm trees to the south and west of the building, integrated with the carpark and pathways. It is considered that the staggered configuration of the proposed Chinese Elms, when also combined with replacement *Cupressus* plantings along the block boundaries, will block views to the building from the public domain and create a more enclosed landscape setting.

Accordingly, while the overall concept is supported, the proposed tree species and arrangement layout require further amendments to ensure the heritage significance of the place is retained and improved.

Given the above, and as a Council delegate, I advise that the following are required to comply with *Heritage Act 2004* requirements:

- 1. Use of low scale conifers for replacement of the existing *Cupressus* trees along block boundaries, with the species to be used specified in updated plans; and
- 2. Reconsideration of the species and/or location of proposed Chinese Elm plantings within the carpark, to improve the visual dominancy of the building when it is viewed from the public domain.

Further, please note that trees proposed for removal may need approval from other entities, for example, if they are 'regulated trees' under the *Tree Protection Act 2005*.

A revised submission which addresses these comments is welcome.

I have been asked to provide you with some details around the approval for the redevelopment around the curtilage of the Canberra Girls Grammar School Boarding House, a registered Heritage place on the ACT Heritage Register.

Heritage approval was sought and supported by ACT Heritage for the master plan back in October 2018.

An application to Undertake a Tree Damaging Activity was submitted in October 2022 with supporting documentation and the conservator supported removal of the trees on the basis of "Removal of unsuitable or hazardous trees subject to replacement plantings being undertaken where necessary".

The unmaintained and deteriorating hedge will be replaced with the same species *Cupressus arizonica*. The right side of the grounds (along Melbourne Avenue) was replanted a number of years ago. I believe that the plan is to replicate this along the rest of the boundary.

Attached is a copy of the Landscape Heritage Strategy and an extract from the ACT Heritage response.
