Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: *Prunus* 'Amanogawa' (Pag) **Common Name:** Columnar flowering cherry

Species Description

- Deciduous
- Small columnar/<u>fastigiate</u> shaped tree with erect branches
- Green and red bark with a flaky texture
- Young leaves are greenish-bronze, and mature leaves are green changing to gold and red in autumn
- Dense clusters of semi-double shell-pink flowers in spring
- Small black drupes are rarely formed

Height and width

5 metres tall by 2 metres wide

Species origin

Japan

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥15m³
- Can be used in regional and town shopping centres and urban parks for spring colour
- Suitable for use in home gardens, particularly in narrow spaces

Use considerations

- High frost tolerance and moderate drought tolerance
- Prefers well-drained soils, although most soils with the exception of heavy clays are suitable
- May require additional irrigation during establishment
- · Grows best in sun to part shade
- Medium longevity
- Slow to moderate growth rate
- Very low flammability
- Produces good nectar; attracts bees and birds
- May need spraying to avoid problems with pear and cherry tree slug
