Freedom of information request: Reference – 19-015

I refer to your application made under the *Freedom of Information Act 2016* (the Act), partially transferred from the Chief Minister, Treasury, Economic Development Directorate on 8 February 2019 to Transport Canberra and City Services Directorate in which you sought access to:

- the results for all surveys and polls commissioned by the ACT Government since 6 December 2018.

I am an Information Officer appointed by the Director-General under section 18 of the Act to deal with access applications made under Part 5 of the Act.

TCCS is required to provide a decision on your access application by 8 March 2019. I note you agreed to an extension until 17 April 2019.

Decision on access

Searches were completed for relevant documents and 3 documents (333 pages) were identified that fall within the scope of your request.

I have included at Attachment A to this decision the schedule of relevant documents. This provides a description of each document that falls within the scope of your request and the access decision for each of the documents.

Documents identified as relevant to your request contain information that I consider to be, on balance, contrary to the public interest to disclose under the test set out in section 17 of the Act.

I have decided to grant access, under section 50 of the Act, to copies of documents (Attachment B) with deletions applied to information that I consider would be contrary to the public interest to disclose.

Statement of Reasons

In reaching my access decision, I have taken the following into account:

- the FOI Act in particular Schedule 2; and
- the content of the documents that fall within the scope your request.

Factors favouring disclosure (Schedule 2)

- Section 2.1 (a)(iii) – inform the community of the government’s operations, including the policies, guidelines and codes of conduct followed by the government in its dealings with members of the community; and
- Section 2.1 (a)(viii) – reveal the reason for a government decision and any background or contextual information that informed the decision.

Factors favouring non-disclosure (Schedule 2)

- Section 2.2 (a)(ii) – prejudice the protection of an individual’s right to privacy or any other right under the *Human Rights Act 2004*.

As an Information Officer, I am required to decide where, on balance, public interest lies.

As part of this process I must consider factors favouring disclosure and non-disclosure.

I consider that it is in the public interest to release most of the information identified as falling within the scope of your request.

Document 1 and 2 provides the results of our playground workshops and document 3 provides the final results of our traffic speed surveys which were undertaken in December 2018.

Release of the information is in the public interest as it informs the community of the government’s operations which can affect members of the community and the process followed by government when managing infrastructure projects and works related to playgrounds and roads. It also improves the Directorate’s accountability for the work it undertakes by being transparent in releasing the information. I consider that the evidentiary basis for decisions, provided in the outcomes of public consultation, have distinct public interest value.

I note however that documents 1 and 2 do contain personal information of participants. This information also includes both names, contact details and photographs. It is not in the public interest to disclose information that could prejudice a person’s right to privacy and in this case, I have decided to redact such information.

Considering the type of information I propose to withhold from release, I am satisfied that the factors in favour of release can still be met while protecting the personal information of individuals involved. I find the protection of this information outweighs disclosure in this instance. As a result, I have decided that release of this information could prejudice their right to privacy under the *Human Rights Act 2004*.

Charges

The first 50 pages of a release of information are provided free of charge. Your request has exceeded the threshold of 50 pages. The number of pages is 333 pages. The charge for your FOI request is \$99.05. I am required to waive these fees under section 107 of the Act as you are a Member of the Legislative Assembly.

Online publishing – disclosure log

Under section 28 of the Act, TCCS maintains an online record of access applications called a disclosure log. Your original access application, my decision and documents 2 and 3 will be published in the TCCS disclosure log from 3 days after the date of this decision.

Although every effort has been taken to de-identify photographs of individuals that are identifiable in document 1, I have decided that it is not information that should be published on the disclosure log as it includes images of children.

Ombudsman review

My decision on your access request is a reviewable decision as identified in Schedule 3 of the Act. You have the right to seek Ombudsman review of this outcome under section 73 of the Act within 20 working days from the day that my decision is published in TCCS' disclosure log, or a longer period allowed by the Ombudsman.

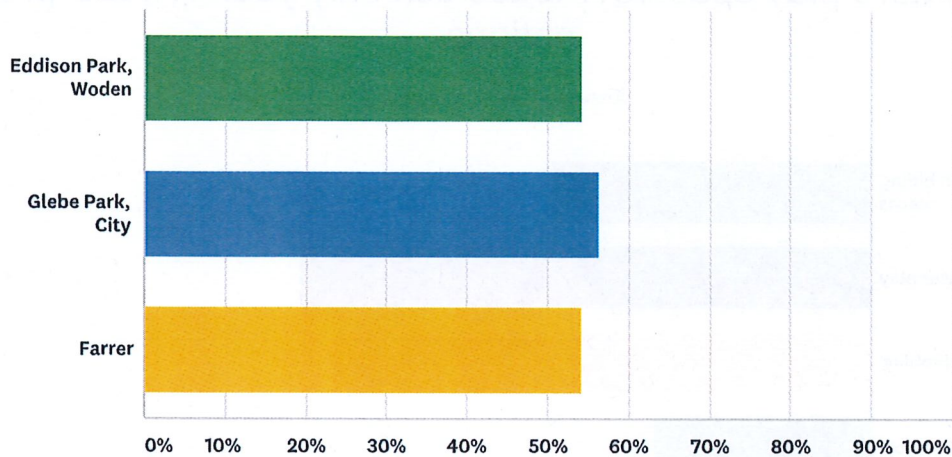

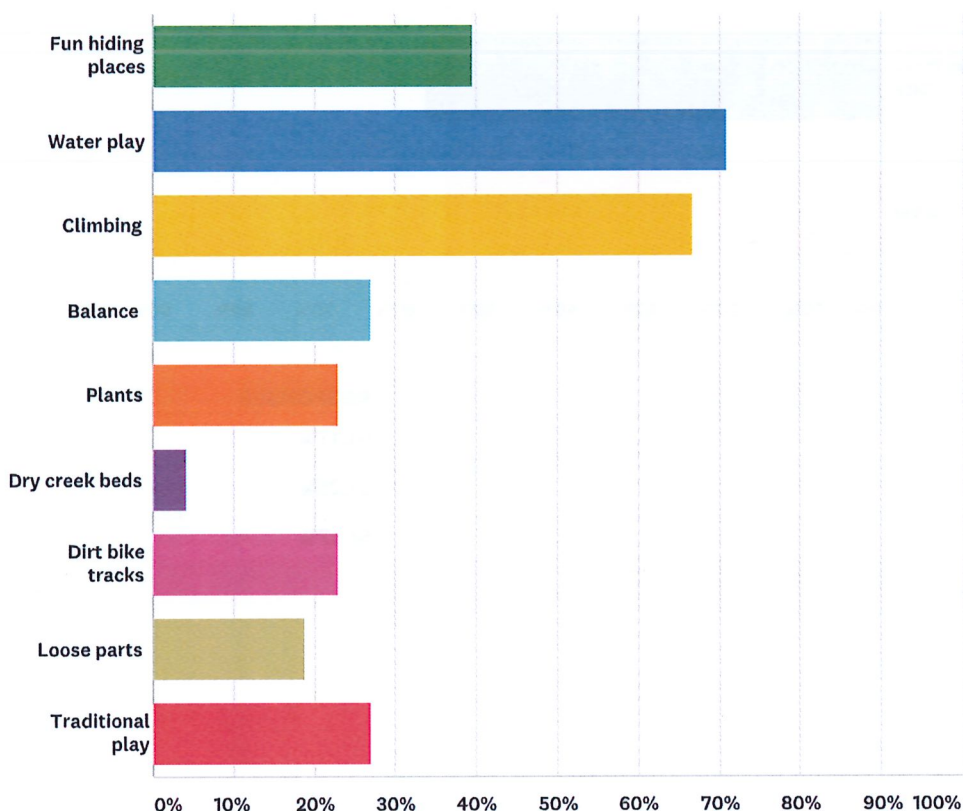

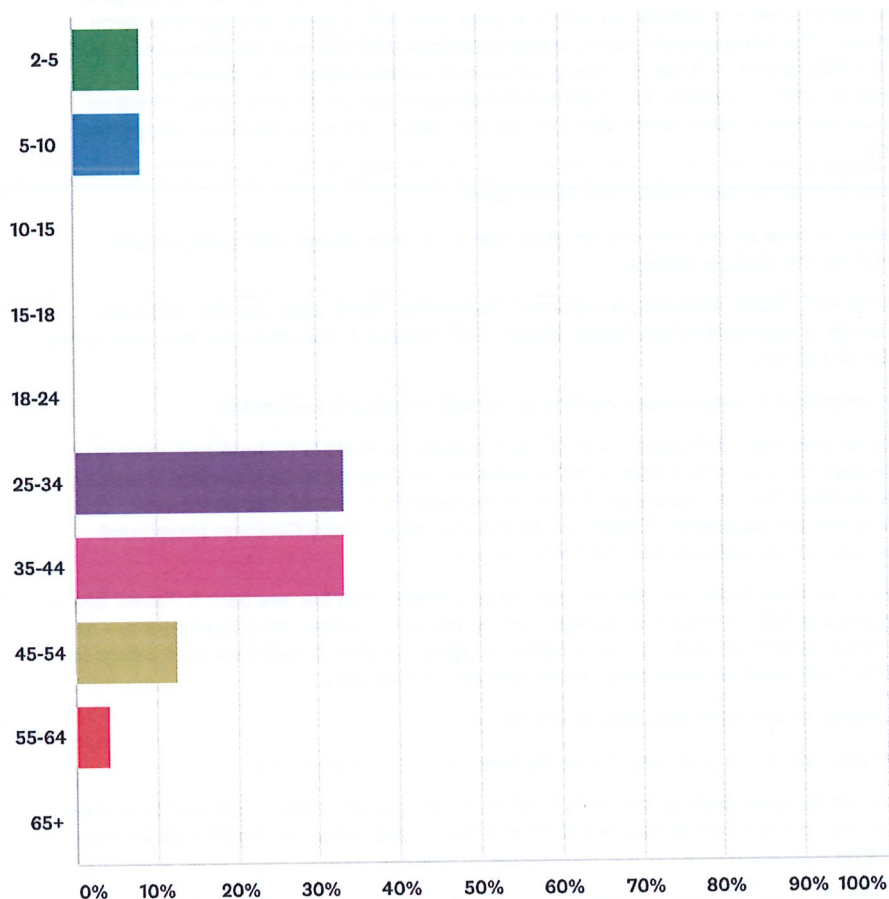
