Plant Species for Urban Landscape Projects in Canberra

Botanical Name: Quercus rubra (Qru) (syn. Quercus borealis)

New species

Common Name: Red oak, Champion oak

Species Description

- Deciduous
- Rounded to broad spreading form
- Dark reddish grey brown bark with broad, thin, rounded ridges that appear to have shiny stripes down the centre
- Toothed leaves which are dark green and smooth, turning a rich red to brown in autumn
- Male flowers are yellow-green <u>catkins</u> in spring
- Acorns occur singly or in clusters of from two to five, partially enclosed by a scaly cup

Height and width

8 to 10 metres tall by 9 metres wide

Species origin

Eastern USA, south-east Canada

Landscape use

- Available Soil Volume required: ≥30m³
- Ideal for larger parks and gardens
- Could be used as a street tree where space permits, in conjunction with a secondary, faster growing street species

Use considerations

- Suitable for Canberra's climate and has performed very well in the past
- High frost tolerance and moderate drought tolerance
- Tolerates a wide variety of soils but performs best in moist, well-drained acidic soils in cooler areas
- Long lived
- Moderate to fast growth rate with adequate water access
- Low flammability
